Redeemed by Love

True love comes from God alone. The Holv Apostle, St. John, records for us the words of Jesus, "For this is how God loved the world. that He gave His only begotten Son, in order that all who would believe in Him would not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). God's love isn't superficial or transient like so much of this life. God's love is a matter of life and death. God's love for us is the death of His beloved Son that we might in Him have eternal life. God has given for us and to us His own eternal Son that in His suffering, death and resurrection we might receive and have the sure confidence and comfort of eternal life. The display and reality of God's love is Jesus who died upon the cross.

This is the love that we're commanded to reflect as we deal with one another in our day-to-day lives. Jesus said that the summary of the law is, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul and mind" and "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22:37-39). Love is the fulfillment of the law.

Yet, this love isn't simply the fulfillment of an obligation, but a reflection of the love, which God has first given to us. We, who have been shown and made a part of God's love, are to also love one another in the same way. Even as God has forgiven *us*, so we forgive *one another*. Even as God places us and our needs foremost (thus sending His Son as our Savior) so we place our spouse, our children, our parents, our family, our neighbors, our friends and coworkers, etc. first and foremost.

The problem is that we live in a sinful world—a world of which we all are a part for we are all conceived and born sinful (Ps. 51:5). This world of which we are a part and in which we participate is marked more by hate and division than by love. But then, that should be expected—the prince of this world, the Devil, is the prince of darkness, a liar and a murderer from the beginning.

Consequently, the great American festival of love, Valentine's Day, is frequently nothing but a cheap charade. There will be all sorts of expressions of love that day: candy, cards, flowers and parties—many reflecting the deep love that we have for one another. But, all too soon, the candy is gone, the flowers are wilted, and the cards and decorations discarded. Soon forgotten, Valentine's Day 2008, and all its perks, will pass away and be discarded.

The solution isn't found within us. It's not something that we can achieve by our efforts. Nor is it to be found in the holidays of this world that typically have no meaning beyond immediate pleasure. The answer is found in the church, the House of God. This is the place where God comes with His gracious eternal gifts.

Far more important than Valentine's Day is the first Wednesday of this month, February 6th, Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. With this Festival, the Church begins her preparation for the great celebration of the glorious act of love on God's part. On this day, the Church begins her preparation to remember the suffering and death of Jesus upon the cross and His glorious resurrection from the grave three days latter. The Church looks forward to the great festivals, for in *them* is displayed the great love of God — Jesus Christ and Him crucified (1 Cor. 2:1-5).

Chairman's Message: "In the Pink"

In the floral business, the color pink means "I will never forget you." The color pink creates a calming feeling of love and acceptance. This holds true for the congregation at Faith too.

Last month, the members of Faith approved our annual budget. Weekly, we must receive an average of \$2,550 to meet our monetary requirements. This figure includes \$729 for our monthly mortgage payment of \$3,160. Over the past year we have requested additional member pledges in an effort to prepare for those times when our weekly gifts to the Lord fall below the average needed. But, these pledges will not be enough to sustain us over the next 30 years of our mortgage period. To help in this effort the Council has incorporated new pink envelopes in our giving envelope packets replacing the former building fund envelopes, but retaining the "Facing the Future with Faith" logo.

The pink envelopes are now labeled "Mortgage Fund Offering." Please use these envelopes to make any additional gifts, whether you have made a formal pledge or not, that you wish directed towards the reduction of our building debt, and shortening of our mortgage period. Any outstanding FFF campaign contributions can also be placed in these envelopes.

When you see one of these envelopes, remember the love of Jesus Christ and the precious gift given to us so that we may remain confident in our eternal salvation through Him. In thanksgiving, help keep our church in the pink.

Looking Ahead...

Last year, our annual meeting was held in the auditorium at Blackhawk College. This year, as the realization of years of planning, work, and sacrifice; our annual meeting was in our *own* building.

For the past several years, the emphasis has been on constructing this building, which is a good thing. But, the problem has been that in this congregation, as in almost all congregations, about ten percent of the members do ninety percent of the work. That ten percent here, has been focused on getting this building constructed and furnished. The more normal congregational functions were put on the back-burner, Now that the building work is so-to-speak. substantially competed, the emphasis for 2008, and future years, will shift to what congregations more normally do: outreach, membership conservation, and striving toward more active membership participation. And, in *doing* all those things, we don't want to be a typical congregation, with the same overburdened 10% doing 90% of the work. There's work that 100% of the members of Faith Lutheran Church can do, and should be doing to live lives of service to God, to his church, and to the community-at-large.

Through prayer and participation, with God's help through his Law, Gospel, and Sacraments; we'll be building-up *our* spiritual lives, and reaching out to *others* with the Good News of life and salvation in Jesus Christ.
