

Council News: Council met on December 14th to review a 2024 Budget and nominations of officers. The treasurer reported the General fund balance was \$40,927.86, and the Designated fund balance is \$18,939.57 for a total of \$59,867.43. The mortgage balance is \$138,075.90. Through November yearly expenses leads yearly income by \$7,724.98 and member contributions are \$5235 under budget needs. Church mice evidence has appeared and new traps will be set in the lower level. A proposed budget for 2024 was set at \$76,930. No nominations for officers were received.

Operation Thankful 2023 was a program sponsored by Faith congregation during Advent season to assist the Kewanee Food Pantry. On Thursday, January 4th, the items will be delivered to the pantry. Thank you to all those who donated food or cash contributions to this effort.



CID NEWS: Rev. Burnell Eckardt, St. Paul – Kewanee has announced his upcoming retirement. A pre-call meeting has been conducted. Holy Cross - Moline was assigned vicar *Jacob Corrigan (Danielle)* [CTSFW] working under the supervision of the Rev. Dr. Wilfred Karsten. Pastor Karsten has announced his upcoming retirement for mid-2024. The CID has 34 vacancies, 27 actively calling or on temporary hold.

A: The short answer is no. A Christian desires to go to church because here the service provides things that create and sustain faith. Christians hunger and thirsts for the gifts of righteousness, forgiveness, the Sacrament, and Holy Absolution. To demand or require worship attendance is turning God's Gospel into Law. God graciously invites us to come to Him for rest. (Matt. 11:28) "Have to go to church?" No! I want to go.

The Chief Stewards of Humanity: Mom and Dad

St. Paul tells the Ephesians that the first commandment with a specific promise attached to it is, "Honor your father and mother so that it may go well with you, and you may live long in the land" (Eph. 6:2). This promise is one indication of the importance of this commandment. The other thing that highlights the special nature of this commandment is its placement within the Ten Commandments.

The Ten Commandments are clearly organized in two big categories. The first three commandments deal with our relationship with God. This category is called the First Table of the Law. The last seven commandments, the Second Table of the Law, tell us how we should relate to other people. These two tables correspond to what Jesus calls the two greatest commandments: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind," and "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22:37–39).

The order of the Second Table of the Law is also important. Murder is a greater sin than adultery, which is a greater sin that stealing, or lying, or coveting. But why is the Fourth Commandment first in the Second Table, ahead of "you shall not murder"? Is disobeying your parents really worse than murder? Or maybe we should give up on thinking these commandments are ordered?

The overall effect of this order is to get us to see our parents as a connection point between our neighbors and our God. Throughout our upbringing our father and mother stand between us and God and deliver His gifts to us: God clothes us, feeds us, protects us and teaches His Word to us through our parents.

So, parents have a very high calling from God. They are called to be stewards of the greatest gift: the gift of life. Parenting thus gives us a keen insight into all our stewardship. Parents know that they have been given a great treasure in their children, a treasure that does not belong to them, yet for which they feel a great deal of responsibility. Truth be told, every gift we have been given is like this, because everything we have — whether our own personal skills and powers or our wealth and time — is all from God. He entrusts it all to us so that we can use it all and take care of it all for His great purposes.
