Fear: What are you afraid of? Is what you fear a present danger? Or is it just an abstract possibility? Some fears make sense. Some don't. If what you fear is something you really have to face, then get ready for it. Learn about its real dangers. Learn what others have done to overcome it. Deal with it calmly, deliberately, decisively. You do not have to live in fear. You can live with fear. With God's help you can even conquer your fears. The Bible tells us: "perfect love casts out fear" (1 John 4:18). "And we ourselves have known and have believed the love which God has among us. God is love, and he who remains in love remains in God, and God remains in him" (4:16). So trust the God who loves you, and "Do not be afraid" (Gen. 15:1 + 128 more times).

But you still have fears. What do you fear most? I am pretty sure that that is the wrong fear. How can I say that? Because I know what should be everyone's greatest fear. Jesus taught: "stop being afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; but rather fear Him who can ruin both soul and body in hell" (Matt. 10:28). We naturally fear what might kill us, whether it is someone pointing a deadly weapon at us, or an angry mob, or a virus. But nothing on earth which can kill us can send us to hell. Who can do that? Only God. But God also is the only One who can "raise those who are dead and make them alive" (John 5:21). So "we should fear, love, and trust in God above all things" (Luther's *Small Catechism*, first commandment).

The Bible teaches how we benefit from having a healthy fear of God. "The fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom; all who do these things have good comprehension" (Psalm 111:10). "You who fear the LORD, trust in the LORD: He is their help and their shield" (Ps. 115:11). "Happy is everyone who fears the LORD, who goes in His ways. ... you will be happy, and it will be good for you" (Ps. 128:1-2). "In this way a man who fears the LORD will be blessed" (Ps. 128:4). "O LORD ... with You there is pardon, in order that You may be feared" (Ps. 130:3-4). "The fear of the LORD is to hate evil" (Prov. 8:13). "The fear of the LORD adds days, but the years of wicked people will be short" (Pr. 10:27). "The fear of the LORD is for life, and he will spend the night satisfied, he will not be visited by evil" (Pr. 19:23).

"Let all the earth fear the LORD; Let all the inhabitants of the world be intimidated by Him" (Ps. 33:8). The world has lots of problems, because people do not fear the LORD enough. They commit crimes, thinking no one can see them. But God sees everything, and He will right all wrongs. "For we all must appear in front of the judicial bench of Christ, in order that each would get the things for which he strove through the body, whether good or bad" (2 Cor. 5:10). If people feared the LORD's judgment, we would do less evil and more good. May God give us biblical fear: "My flesh bristled due to the dread of You, and I was afraid of Your judgments" (Ps. 119:120). Yet believe God's promises: "Fear the LORD, you His saints, because there is no lack for those who fear Him" (Ps. 34:9).

When we fear the LORD, we have nothing else to fear. God promised through the prophet Isaiah: "this is what the LORD said, He who created you ... and He who formed you ...: 'Do not be afraid, because I redeemed you; I called you by name; you are Mine'" (Is. 43:1). God sent His Son to rescue you from all fears. At Jesus' birth an angel announced: "Stop being afraid, for ... I am telling you a good message of great joy which will be for all the people, because a Savior, who is Christ the Lord, was born for you" (Luke 2:10-11). On Easter an "angel said, 'stop being afraid, for I know that you are seeking Jesus who has been crucified. He is not here, for He was raised'" (Matt. 28:6). "So they went out quickly from the tomb with fear and great joy, and ran to bring His disciples word. And as they went to tell His disciples, behold, Jesus met them, saying, "Rejoice!" ... Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid. Go, tell My brothers to go to Galilee, and there they will see Me." (Matt. 28:8-10) Jesus lived, died, and rose in order to give you life with God even after death.



LCMS Stewardship Ministry– October 2020

We celebrate the Reformation at the end of each October. The Reformation began on All Saints' Eve in 1517, which was when Martin Luther posted the 95 Theses to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. So, let's hear from Luther himself on the topic of giving and stewardship.

In the Small Catechism under the Table of Duties, Martin Luther gives specific Bible passages to help Christians know their duty in their various vocations as members of their family, society at large, and in God's family, the Church. Under the heading "What Hearers Owe Their Pastors," Luther lists five passages from the Bible, three of which have to do with giving to your local congregation. They are these:

"The Lord has commanded that those who preach the gospel should receive their living from the gospel." (1 Cor. 9:14)

"Anyone who receives instruction in the word must share all good things with his instructor. Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows." (Gal. 6:6–7)

"The elders [presbyters, i.e., pastors] who direct the affairs of the church well are worthy of double honor, especially whose work is preaching and teaching. For the Scripture says, 'Do not muzzle the ox while it is treading out the grain,' and 'The worker deserves his wages.'" (1 Tim. 5:17–18)

Luther comments on these passages in his 1535 Lectures on Galatians. He wrote:

"When Paul says 'all good things,' this is not to be taken to mean that everyone should share all his possessions with his preacher. No, it means that he should provide for him liberally, giving him as much as is needed to support his life in comfort. ... The apostle is so serious in advocating this topic of support for preachers that he adds a threat to his denunciation and exhortation, saying: 'God is not mocked.' ... All this pertains to the topic of support for ministers. I do not like to interpret such passages; for they seem to commend us, as in fact they do. In addition, it gives the appearance of greed if one emphasizes these things diligently to one's hearers. Nevertheless, people should be taught also about this matter, in order that they may know that they owe both respect and support to their preachers. Christ teaches the same thing in Luke 10:7: 'Eating and drinking what they provide, for the laborer deserves his wages'; and Paul says elsewhere (1 Cor. 9:13–14): 'Do you not know that those who are employed in the temple service get their food from the temple, and those who serve at the altar share in the sacrificial offerings? In the same way the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the Gospel should get their living by the Gospel.' It is important for us who are in the ministry to know this, so that we do not have a bad conscience about accepting for our work wages."

Keep Christ on Campus: The Central Illinois District has important campus ministries at University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, Illinois State University, Eastern Illinois University, and Western Illinois University. It has become more and more financially difficult to maintain these ministries. This will be still harder in the future, as the District will likely receive fewer dollars to apply to mission efforts.

Enter Lutheran Legacy Foundation of Paris, Illinois! Four endowment funds created by Lutheran Legacy, one for each current campus, will provide the District with earnings with which it can continue to support ministry to students, faculty, and staff members. Lutheran Legacy has contributed an initial \$10,000 apiece to these funds. What's more, Lutheran Legacy will also match, dollar for dollar, the first \$10,000 contributed to each of the funds between now and July 1, 2021.

Won't you contribute to one or more of these endowment funds? Now is a great time for a gift to continue the Central Illinois District's historic strong support of campus ministry. Under the Lord's blessing, your gift will help to insure keeping Christ on campus for years to come.
