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October is here along with its beautiful fall foliage, the World Series, cooler temperatures, pumpkins, and the beginning of the Holiday sales for the retailers. Since 1992 October has traditionally been designated as Pastor Appreciation Month — an opportunity for congregations to express, in various ways, their thankfulness to the shepherds who care for them. Members are encouraged to lift up their pastors all the time, not just during October, but throughout the year. All pastors are human and need encouragement and validation just as much as you do. I'd also add that encouraging the pastor's family is also critical — taking the time to tell the pastor's wife on how much you appreciate her sacrifices.

Members should respect the pastoral office as it was established by Christ himself. Ministers keep watch over you as men who must give an account. Obey them so that their work will be a joy, not a burden, for that would be of no advantage to you. In 1 Timothy 5:17 Paul establishes the concept of clergy appreciation when he states that the elders of the church are worthy of double honor, especially those responsible for preaching and teaching. He reiterates this idea in 1 Thessalonians 5:12-13, when he states that those who work hard among you should be held in the highest regard. "*Now we ask you, brothers and sisters, to acknowledge those who work hard among you, who care for you in the LORD and who admonish you. Hold them in the highest regard in love because of their work. Live in peace with each other.*"

An important way to show appreciation is through our prayers, asking the Lord of the Church to give our pastor wisdom, strength, courage and peace, asking Him to bless our pastors' ministry among us and to work powerfully through their proclamation of the Word and administration of the Sacraments. Gift cards, checks, and Hallmark cards are nice and warm reminders from parishioners of their appreciation, but if you want to truly express your appreciation, show it by coming to hear the Word in worship and Bible study and taking to heart their words.

The congregation has a duty to assist their pastor as they encourage and support him in the ministry entrusted to him. They volunteer their time, by serving in a variety of ways in the parish, and give of their treasures. The pastor is not a "hired hand" who is to do all the work of the congregation. Telling the good news of the for-giveness of sins in Jesus, in many different situations and opportunities in life, is a task and duty given to all Christians, not only pastors (Matt.28:19- 20; 1 Peter 2:9; 1 Peter 3:15).

What a blessing pastors have been to God's people down through the ages! May God continue to bless the Church mightily through His gift of pastors. Thank you so much, Pastor Weber!



**Church Council Report:** The treasurer reported the General Fund balance is \$48,683.37, the Memorial/ Dedicated Fund is \$13,424.74 for a total of \$62,108.11. The Church Extension Fund Balance is \$161,794.36. \$790.00 has been received in memorials for Wendell Hier. The family has indicated that these may be used at the church's discretion. The door offering for Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Bristol, Tennessee was \$300.00.

**OKTOBERFEST 2022:** This year's Oktoberfest dinner will once again be a drive thru meal on October 13th. Meals will be served under the front portico of the church. The price of the dinner is \$12.00, which includes a bratwurst sandwich, German potato salad, sauerkraut, and dessert. Advance ticket sales are encouraged to help determine the amount of food to prepare. Tickets are available from Wayne Becker, and money should be returned to him, preferably no later than October 9th. Meals may be purchased at the drive thru line. Serving will be from 4:30 to 6:30 that evening. A volunteer helper sign up sheet is available in the narthex. Also, fruit pies donations are requested for dessert servings.

**Stewardship Matters:** The return of high inflation rates fuels anxiety about the future and our financial security. When the cost of nearly everything is rising, it is hard not to wonder if our income will cover all our monthly bills. Situations like this, however, are one reason why faithful stewardship practices are so important. The Biblical basis for carefully managing all we have, as well as giving generously to those in need, is God's promise to provide steadfastly for all of our needs. Acting on that promise in good financial times encourages us to keep trusting God in more difficult ones. The one constant on which we can always rely is His faithfulness to us!

Q: Why do the creeds say "holy Christian Church" instead of "holy catholic Church"? A: In their original languages, the Apostles' and Nicene creeds describe the Church as "catholic" (small c). It is a Greek word that means "universal" and declares that there is only one Christian Church on earth.

After the Reformation, the Church of Rome more intentionally used "Catholic" (capital C) to distinguish itself as the true Church over against Lutherans and other Protestants. Over time, that use of Catholic began to function as a denominational title. It then made more sense for Lutherans to use "Christian," since we are part of the catholic Church, but clearly not the Catholic Church.

In 1978, when the Lutheran Book of Worship (green hymnal) was published, the creeds were switched back to using "catholic Church" instead. The reasons for the change were not at all clear. Despite its original meaning, people easily assume that "catholic" (capitalized or not) refers to the Roman Catholic Church and are often baffled as to why Lutherans would confess their faith in "the holy catholic Church."

So, to clarify our confession—to ourselves and especially to guests—we have reclaimed the word that Lutherans consistently use confessing our faith in "the holy Christian Church." It has exactly the same meaning as (small-c) catholic, but we hope it communicates more clearly what the phrase actually denotes.
