Christ's Resurrection: Do Christians gather every Easter simply to commemorate a historical event that took place nearly 2,000 years ago? Jesus promised, "I am the Resurrection and the Life. Whoever believes in Me, though he die, yet shall he live" (John 11:25). Many people simply cannot believe in the resurrection or any miracle for that matter. Dead people do not come back to life, not today or in the past. Therefore, Jesus could not have risen from the dead. The reason for this is that nothing so contradicts our natural experience as this does. Our eyes see that everything in this world is swept away by death and dies. Even the temple Jewish sect, the Sadducees, believed that there was neither an afterlife nor a resurrection of the dead.



Christ is Risen! Jesus' disciples experienced a life-altering moment that shattered their sense of control and security, leaving them vulnerable and afraid. Jesus appeared to them after He was crucified, died, and was buried. They thought He was a ghost! Jesus offered comfort, inviting them to touch his Hands and feet, to see and believe in His bodily resurrection. The bodily resurrection of Jesus is not merely a historical fact, but a cornerstone of faith with far-reaching implications. It validates Jesus' identity and mission, demonstrating His victory over death and fulfilling ancient prophecies about the Messiah. The risen Christ is a preview of what is to come for all who have been baptized into His death and live in faith. Paul told the Romans, "For if we have been united with Him in a death like His, we shall certainly be united with Him in a resurrection like His" (Rom. 6:5).

Each time we recite the Apostles Creed or the Nicene Creed we profess a belief in a resurrection body. Have you ever taken time to bear in mind what this means? Someday, the resurrected you will be imperishable because Jesus will destroy sin and death forever. Our resurrected body will be raised in glory and power because we will then participate in the divine nature (2 Peter 1:4). Christ's resurrection teaches us that He has destroyed death by death and has removed the debt of sin which we owe. You will possess a spiritual body, one suitable for life in the new heaven and earth. Soul and body are united once again. In the resurrection of the body, there will be no more forgiveness because there will be no more sin.

As we navigate life's uncertainties, let's depend on the bodily resurrection of Jesus. Let's make decisions rooted in trust, build relationships based on love and forgiveness, and cultivate inner dialogues filled with faith and as much love for others as God has for us. The resurrection of Jesus isn't just a past event; it's a present reality that empowers us to live with joy and peace, no matter what challenges may come our way. He is Risen indeed!

Almighty God, by the glorious resurrection of Your Son, Jesus Christ, You destroyed death and brought life and immortality to light. Grant that we who have been raised with Him may abide in His presence and rejoice in the hope of eternal glory; through the same Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.



Monetary donations went to help cover medical expenses for Allison Leezer. There was ample food and it was delicious.

Council News: The treasurer's April report indicated the general fund has \$51,132.30, the memorial fund has \$15,691.04 for a total of \$66,823.34. The CEF rebate check for \$1,614.69 was deposited and applied to the mortgage principle. The church extension fund balance is \$109,943.30.

Pastor Weber informed that he has received confirmation of registration to the CID Convention in July. An ascension evening service has been set for Thursday, May 29th at 6:30pm.

Electrician, Ken Westefer, has installed the interior LED lights, EXIT signs, Outside Parking lamps, and our emergency lighting. Emergency lighting had to be replaced at a cost to the church of approximately \$200.

The church's mower will be taken in for blade sharpening and maintenance for the growing season. Sue and Joe Cervantez have done some tree pruning, and Marilyn Sturtevant cleaned out the front landscaping areas.

Council continues to correct necessary elevator inspection items. The pit sump pump was replaced. Council is working with the Kewanee Fire Department to correct items from their inspection in hopes they will provide us a wavier from the expensive work required by the State of Illinois in the shaft area. Our fire suppression system was inspected and some corrective work remain to be done. Otis Elevator will be contracted to repair the telephone in the elevator.

We thank Cheryl Snyder for making four new banners that hang on the north wall during the Easter season depicting the passion, death and resurrection of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

O: What are the differences in the five Divine Settings in the Lutheran Service Book?

A: The Lutheran Service Book has five settings so that every Lutheran would have a setting that felt familiar to them and provide a rich variety of ways to celebrate in our worship life together each week! Both the sacramental and sacrificial parts are beautifully interwoven melody that runs throughout the Divine Service basic pattern of worship.

Settings 1 and 2 are based on the ancient liturgy of the Church, similar to the Roman Catholic Mass. The tones for much of the service are from Gregorian chant . The settings include new canticles ("This Is the Feast," "Thank the Lord") and an expanded version of the Kyrie. Setting 2 is the same liturgy but with a different musical setting. DS II is stronger in musical presentation.

Setting 3 is also known as "Page 15" from The Lutheran Hymnal (TLH). It has its roots in Anglican worship and may have been adapted for Lutheran use when the change to English language worship was made. The music is a mix of old German Lutheran tunes with roots in the Middle Ages and four-part Anglican chant tones.

Setting 4 is a simpler setting of the service, originally prepared for Hymnal Supplement 98. As in Setting 5, there is no chant music provided for dialogue between pastor and people.

Setting 5 is based on Luther's German Mass (1526), using classic Lutheran hymns in place of the canticles. The order of service is filled out so that it more closely resembles the other settings in LSB. The hymns that replace the canticle parts of the liturgy are not commonly known by many parishioners
